TO LEARN SOME GREAT DIVE TRAVEL TIPS!




- Ken Kollwitz is a long-time club member, joining the club around 1992. He held two club board positions, the Dive Coordinator for about 15 years and the President for four years.

October Monterey Weekend Club Event

"A success and failure all at the same time..."

Because I was the one that set the trip up, I figured it was my responsibility to let everyone know how I thought the trip turned out.

You see, I was a bit selfish in introducing something to possibly replace the Catalina trip but I now see why the Catalina trip works out so well and probably the biggest reason is everyone is a captured audience. My wife and I haven't attended the Catalina trip in many years. I was the person who started them over 20 years ago and I sort of got tired of the same thing plus the dates no longer work for me because of DEMA. I will say it took many trips to different hotels and even a couple of trips to Two Harbors before finding the Pavilion Lodge. Of course, back then, it wasn't the same place you see now.

Why a success and failure all at the same time? I'll be happy to explain.

The successes were many and I do believe more club members now realize there is much to do in the Monterey area so they can go back on their own. My wife and I love Monterey and because the area offers so much, we can never run out of things to do there.

So, what all did we do to make it a success?

It all started with our drive North. We left on time on Thursday at 1:30 pm and always stop in King City for dinner at a Mexican restaurant. This time we tried a new one out and it was the BEST. I am already looking forward to going back to try some other specialties out. Friday morning was our whale watching trip. It was foggy out all day but the whales, dolphins and Risso dolphins made for an excellent trip, especially the show we got at the end of the trip. It was probably the second-best whale watching trip Tessie and I have done.

After whale watching... I took care of some business at Light & Motion in Marina and at 6 pm it was time for our potluck which is always fun. The plan was to have it at our room but that changed when we realized it was much smaller than expected, then it was going to be in the meeting room at the hotel but same thing so we moved it outside to an area with a propane firepit. Even though it was outside I think that area worked out better than expected. Big thank you to Fahmy and Jimmy for getting the propane firepit working and Jimmy for bringing the game Farkle for us to play.

Saturday turned out to be beautiful and sunny which was perfect for our boat dives. Due to several factors, the brave 10 CIDA divers that had planned on diving was reduced to 4 brave divers which was Eric, Pat, Rob and Lina not including myself. I was able to find replacements for 3 of those not going. The seas were actually better than expected but vis wasn't. Our first dive at Mr. Eds, we had at most 10ft of visibility and it was dark at 70ft. The cool thing was the rocky terrain with ling cod, large scallops and all the metridiums. As long as you moved slow and didn't stray too far from the anchor you were good. The second dive was at Otter Cove. It was a shallower dive between 25-35ft deep but the visibility was much better and close to 25ft. It was nice and relaxing with an average water temp of 60 degrees which is warm for Monterey. After diving Eric and I made a sidetrip to Backscatter. *(continued on next page)*

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For those not diving, one small group went wine tasting.

I was told this was a different type of wine tasting experience. One group followed Ann to some of her favorite places in Carmel and the other group went hiking around Asilomar Beach. Later in the early evening we had another get-together at the firepit with some snacks and leftovers from the potluck the previous night. We also had some excitement with some small animals rustling through the bushes behind us. They were the type that had tails, whiskers and were something most females don't like.

Sunday was Aquarium Day for most of us and a good day for it because it was a rainy day.

We had two groups going on tours. The first was a small group of six of us arriving before the aquarium opened so we would be in time for our 11 am free 2-hour private tour I put together with my friend Christy who works in the fish husbandry area of the aquarium. She was sent out to Catalina for some fish collecting at the last minute so she set us up with a friend of hers, Dave Smith who was an awesome tour guide.

The other group did a paid 1-hour tour that I heard was very interesting as well. One thing for sure, if you ever do a behind the scenes tour you will learn that there is so many moving parts and people that are needed to run something like the Monterey Bay Aquarium you will quickly realize why the ticket cost is what it is.



The Fish House Restaurant

Tessie and I hung out with Pat & Sherry in the middle of our aquarium visit we left for lunch going to The Fish House along Cannery Row which I highly recommend. After our wonderful lunch we went back to the aquarium staying till about 4:30 pm. Back at the hotel a little later we had some of the group join Tessie and me in our room for some snacks and socializing. It was a perfect time while it rained outside.

Monday morning was sad as it was time to pack, check out and drive home.

On our way out of town we tried a new breakfast place, The Butter House in Seaside. Needless to say, we will be back for our next visit.

Now it's time for the failures which were many and became comical.

The cost of hotels is comparable especially if you stay in one as nice as the Pavilion. We didn't because there is so much to see and do in the area staying 4 days at a place like the Pavilion would bankrupt everyone. Instead, we stayed at the Lone Oak Lodge which didn't turn out as expected especially for the queen suite Tessie and I had. Some of the rooms that were newly remodeled were nice but ours was stuck in time and it showed. I have had many friends stay at the Lone Oak but unbeknownst to me it was sold a couple years back and nothing now is like they mark it out to be which is why it became comical.

The location and diver wash station were great and that's the only reason I gave it two stars on my review. Some stayed at other hotels but this only separated the group even more. The Pavilion is the BEST, well run, clean and modern, great staff and they have a lot to offer plus they offer breakfast and wine tasting for later in the day.

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I feel the biggest failure for the group was the main reason for going to Monterey. There is so much to see and do it is extremely hard to keep the group even somewhat together. In Avalon, you are a captured audience and everyone can do different things. Because Avalon is a SMALL town you still see each other during the day which gives you a sense of togetherness. That is hard to do in Monterey.

The diving is another factor and one I did think about before. Normally Monterey is colder and the visibility can vary but what you see under the surface is totally different than Catalina. Variety is nice and the only way someone will find out is to experience it first-hand. Maybe had we been in Catalina there wouldn't have been as many divers canceling out on the boat trip.



For me, the biggest plus of the trip was the potluck. Why, because out of the entire trip this was the only time, we all were able to get together including those that stayed at other places. Food always wins!


