Fish Reef Project Drops 'Sea Caves' into Ocean Waters off Goleta Coast

The Nonprofit FISH REEF PROJECT Begins Its Five-Year Goleta Kelp Reef Restoration Project

The first sea cave being lowered into the water. | Credit: Callie Fausey Wednesday morning's clear skies and smooth waters were perfect for ferrying 15 huge concrete domes, or "Sea Caves," to the bay off Goleta Beach and then dumping them overboard.

These 500-pound structures acted as deck seats for our trip from Santa Barbara Harbor, but once we arrived at our destination, they were ready to settle on the seafloor and fulfill their true purpose: creating the foundation for a new kelp forest and artificial reef system.

The caves' deployment was the realization of a long-held dream and 12 years of hard work on behalf of the Fish Reef Project, a Santa Barbara-based nonprofit aiming to replenish depleted underwater habitats on the Central Coast and around the world. It marked the official beginning of the nonprofit's five-year Goleta Kelp Reef Restoration Project.

To make the project a reality, Chris Goldblatt, Fish Reef's founder, had to secure a giant stack of permits from various state and federal departments (he showed me), get a lease from State Lands

There were a few hiccups getting the caves into California from their factory in Mexico and a few more getting them into a cluster on the bay's sandy bottom. However, they did eventually find their place. Goldblatt and the project's other pioneers looked on with pride as each cave was lowered 15 feet into the lapping blue waters.



Designed with flat surfaces for kelp holdfasts and inner chambers for fish habitat, the concrete structures create a dynamic cave system for fish to populate and reproduce. After a few years, Goldblatt believes the caves will look and act entirely natural, with the potential to support giant kelp growth and their fishy residents for up to 500 years.

They hope to see budding kelp by this July, Goldblatt said.

If all goes well, Fish Reef plans to try to expand to a 65-acre project - retaining the study reef as a starting point - to help replenish the Central Coast's now-depleted kelp forest that once extended from El Capitan to Rincon Point.

Our meeting time for April's dive is set for 8 am. Parking will be scarce so it is important to arrive early. Optimal parking can be found off PCH, noted in image, in the southbound lane before the bridge.

NEW CLUB EVENT: WHALE WATCHING WITH ISLAND PACKERS

Sunday, June 23, 2024 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM (6 hours)

Price for club members: \$75

Did you know gray whales were once common throughout the Northern Hemisphere, but they are now only regularly found in the North Pacific Ocean, off the coasts of the United States, Canada, Mexico, and eastern Asia? These large mammals can grow to approximately 49 feet long, weigh about 90,000 pounds, and they make a 12,000 mile roundtrip migration through our backyard (the Santa Barbara Channel) twice a year.

Island Packers reported an exceptional Winter migration of the gray whales. Along with the gray whales, passengers also saw numerous humpback whales, thousands-upon-thousands of common and bottlenose dolphins, and even a basking shark! Now that we are entering the gray whale's and BLUE WHALE'S northern migration season back to the Arctic, the club has booked a non-landing whale watching trip, which will be led by our own Bill Weinerth and Steve Peterson as Park Service Naturalists. Here are the specifics of the trip:

* Price: \$75 for club members. (Non-member must book directly with Island Packers at the regular price of \$79.)

VENTURA BOTANICAL GARDENS HIKE

WHEN: Saturday, May 11, 2024

This event is open to non-members!

Biologist and club member Jackie Worden has agreed to lead this hike. Jackie is an expert on native and invasive species in Ventura County, so don't miss this opportunity to learn more about the flora in our area!

The Ventura Botanical Gardens are truly a community-based effort, with a group of citizens coming together in 2005 to formulate plans for a world-class botanical garden that would display and preserve native plants. After seven years of development, the first trail of the Gardens opened in 2012 and continued to grow and improve since that time. Unfortunately, the December 2017 Thomas Fire caused severe damage, and the Gardens were closed for almost a year for repairs. The 107 acres Ventura Botanical Gardens re-opened on November 3, 2018, with many improvements, which included the Merewether Welcome Center at the entrance to the trails.

The club previously hike the Ventura Botanical Gardens about 15 years ago. Although the layout and the plantings were beautiful, there was an absence of facilities, such as the Welcome Center, at that time. Since then, the Gardens have grown to include a collection of approximately 100,000 plants. The collection strives to replicate plant communities from five different climate zone throughout the world. The climate zone gardens include:

- Chile
- South Africa
- California
- The Mediterranean Basin
- The Ramble (The largest garden on-site, and it is populated by plants native to Southern California.)

Our plan is to meet at the Welcome Center at 9:00 AM and begin the easy-to-moderate 2.1-mile hike, which has 370 feet of elevation gain. There are many places along the hike to stop for a rest and take photos. It takes about two hours to complete the loop, but we will take our time when we reach the summit at Grant Park to take advantage of the magnificent 360-degree view!

Don't miss this opportunity to enjoy the beauty of our area, in addition to learning something from a REAL EXPERT, the club's own Jackie Worden! (NOTE: Depending on the wishes of the group, we might meet for lunch after the hike.)

A signup sheet will be available at our April 17 club meeting.

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Spread out over 107 acres, the Ventura Botanical Gardens collection consists of over 100,000 plants from the mediterranean climate regions of the world. Completion of development for the full 107 acres is slated for the 2040s. The current gardens replicate plant communities and associations as they occur in nature; some areas focus on ornamental displays or annual plantings.

Plantings represent everything from native California vegetation to Mediterranean species, African, and Australian plants.




