FEBRUARY PRESENTATION

Neail Holland

Public Safety Diving

Neail Holland's presentation will provide an in-depth look at the world of Public Safety Diving and the specialized training required to operate in challenging and high-risk environments. Drawing from real-world experience, Neail will discuss the purpose and structure of public safety dive teams, how members are selected and trained, and the unique operational demands these teams face.



The presentation will cover legal considerations, including OSHA requirements, specialized equipment, deployment strategies, and safety protocols used during public safety dive operations. Additional topics include underwater evidence recovery, proper documentation procedures, and how these missions differ significantly from recreational and technical diving.

Neail has been scuba diving since 1989. It wasn't until he came to California in 1991 that he became passionate about scuba diving. Over the years, he sought additional training while diving the California Channel Islands regularly. In 2005, he became a Divemaster and then became a Technical Diver, cave diving with a closed-circuit rebreather, which increased his knowledge and safety awareness. In 2007, Neail became a NAUI Instructor and started Rec2Tec Scuba (one of our club sponsors). Within the next few years, he became an Instructor Trainer and then a Course Director.

Neail is a retired Police Sergeant from the Oxnard Police Department and was a member of the Oxnard Police and Fire Public Safety Dive Team since 2002. He started as a police diver and tender and eventually supervised the unit's operations, personnel, training, and equipment.

Along with scuba diving, Neail enjoys travelling. His travels with fellow scuba divers have taken him through the USA, Mexico, and the Caribbean.

Club Dive Report 1/24/26

County Line Conquest: Bugs, Scallops, and a Knife-Point Catch!

The Pacific gave us a bit of everything for our latest club outing at **County Line**. We had a strong showing with nine divers hitting the water—eight of our dedicated club members (Jessica, Joe, Tony, two Michaels, Isaac, Rob J. and yours truly, Diver Master Dan) along with Andrew, a Rescue Diver from SC Diving who we hope to officially welcome as a new member soon!

The Conditions

The morning started with a moody, overcast sky, and the ocean was feeling lively. We timed our entries through **2–3 foot waves**, though a few larger sets kept everyone on their toes. Once under the surface, the surge was definitely noticeable, making for a real "Channel Islands Workout."

While the initial descent had viz of about 15 feet, the dive transformed as we pushed through the kelp forest. Once we hit the rocky portion of the reef, the visibility opened up to a beautiful **25 feet**, with temperatures holding steady at a comfortable **60 degrees**. Just as the dive peaked, the sun finally broke through the clouds, lighting up the reef perfectly.

The Harvest

It was a productive day for the hunters in the group. Several **lobsters** were bagged, and a nice haul of **scallops** was harvested from the rocks. However, the highlight of the day happened sub-surface in a move that most of us wouldn't believe if we hadn't seen the results:

Good-size halibut taken using nothing but a dive knife!

It's not every day you see a diver go "old school" and come out on top against an halibut without a speargun. Let me describe the scene. Andrew and I had surfaced after about an hour to get our bearings and we were quite a way out, with about 1000 PSI. We marked the stairs on our compasses and started in towards the shore. Rob had mentioned he usually gets his lobsters on the way in and sure enough we both found a keeper, so we had our eyes peeled for more. Suddenly, I feel a tug on my fin and turn around, and Andrew is pointing down at a nice size halibut. I pulled out my 4-inch dive knife and check my air – I'm down to 250 psi. I position myself over the fish and try to determine the best spot to dispatch it. I aim for the spot between the eyes and plunge in my knife. It did not appreciate the attack and proceeded to thrash around, and I lost hold of it. Luckily, the visibility was so good that I was able to watch it swim away and settle back onto the sea floor. I gave chase and to my surprise it did not react. I struck again and it thrashed about some more and attempted to escape once again. Again, I calmly watched it settle back onto the sand. I got close and delivered the final blow. I took my trophy by the gills and casually looked at my air: 98 PSI. I headed to the surface, inflated my BCD, and began the surface swim back to the beach. It was a nice fish and measured 29" and had almost 10 lbs. of steaks. Jessica got some great pictures!

Whether you're hunting for dinner or just enjoying the view in the kelp, these club dives are what it's all about. A huge *thank you* to everyone who came out and made it a safe, successful day.



Fun facts about scallops: Most scallop species remain free-swimming throughout their lives...except the locally occurring Giant Rock or Purple-Hinged Scallop (*Crassadoma gigantea*). This bivalve attaches to hard surfaces after its juvenile free-floating (planktonic) life stage. It is found from Sitka, AK south to Baja's Magdalena Bay, on rocks, oil platform supports and pier footings, from the low intertidal zone to 250 feet. A fishing license is required to collect them, and the bag limit is generally 10. Like many filter-feeders, these bivalves are susceptible to biotoxins from algae, which may cause serious illness in humans. Domoic acid, a neurotoxin, is typically the most common – and most serious – toxin in Southern California. (BTW, it is not killed by cooking.)

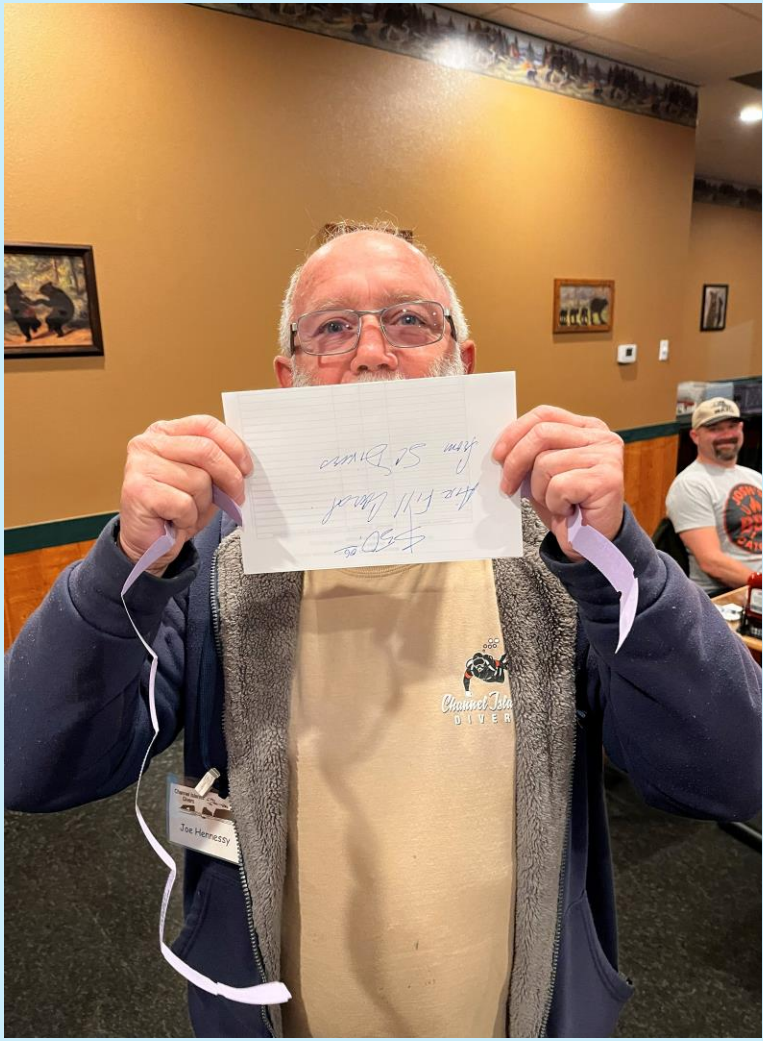

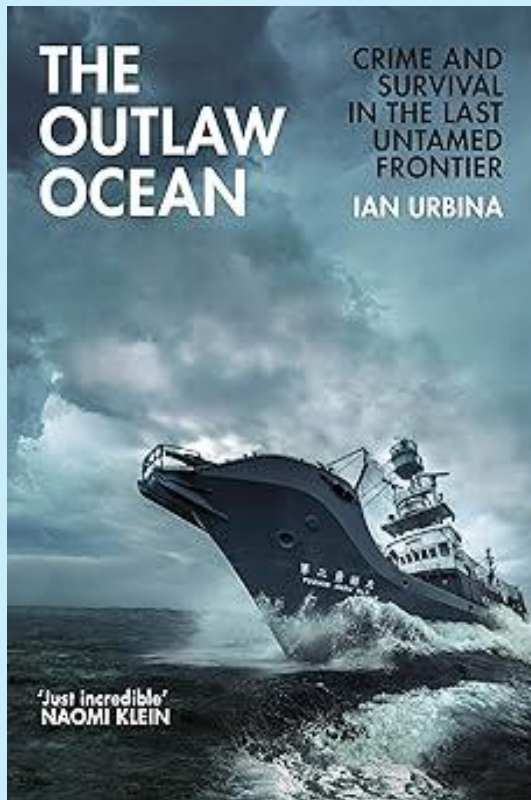
